Peachtree is a small club (just 225 members) with a big history. The story goes that golfing legend and Atlanta native Bobby Jones was playing at his home course, Eastlake, when, frustrated by a slow group on the next tee holding up play, he said, "To hell with this, let's start our own club!" The club he founded was Peachtree. Bobby's co-designer was another Jones - Robert Trent Jones. The course's reputation as one of America's finest courses was confirmed in 1989 when Peachtree hosted the Walker Cup. And as if all that weren't enough, the clubhouse served as General Sherman's headquarters during his March to the Sea, which is why it is one of the few remaining Georgian-era buildings left in Atlanta.

Not only will you and your friends have the chance to play a round at Peachtree, we'll throw in a night's stay at the Ritz-Carlton, Buckhead, situated just three miles from the course, to make sure you're able to relax in style after playing a truly memorable round of golf.


2. Dinner for 10 with Jon Carloftis


An extremely rare antique clock made in 1885 by the Ansonia Clock Company.

The Ansonia Clock Co., of Ansonia, Connecticut, and New York was active between 1851 and 1929 and was one of the most successful companies of its time. The company named a number of their mid-century clocks after states. Blue ash was the wood used for the case design of the "Kentucky" model in a wood rarely found in other clocks of the period. This wood choice was the perfect fit since blue ash is native to the state of Kentucky, particularly the inner Bluegrass region. Statesman Henry Clay named his Lexington estate "Ashland" in honor of this species.







According to donor Taylor Made Farm, which consigned the famous mare to auction, only six people have a halter worn by Havre de Grace. They are Rick Porter, who raced her; his agent Tom McGreevy, who selected her as a yearling for Porter; her trainer Larry Jones; Mandy Pope, who paid

About the artist:

Larry Wheeler (American, b. 1942)

Having drawn and painted from childhood, Larry Wheeler began his formal art studies with portrait painter Jack Brock in Atlanta in 1961. Wheeler received a BFA from the Maryland Institute College of Art in 1966. After several years of work as a painting conservator at the Corcoran Gallery and the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., he returned to Baltimore to study and in 1972 received an MFA from the Institute's Hoffberger School of Painting. He has taught painting, drawing, and anatomy at the Maryland Institute and in community colleges in Baltimore. Since 1979, a major focus of his work has been the integration of the human figure into the natural landscape, most often with horses as the link unifying the image. Atmosphere, design, and relationships between people and their horses are some of the important elements in his paintings, captured in scenes from Palm Beach polo to Irish hunts; from Maryland timber races to racing at Saratoga. Wheeler's commissioned work continues to be in demand. His portraits hang in the State House in Annapolis, Johns Hopkins Hospital, the Supreme Court Building in Washington, D.C., the Federal Building in Baltimore, and in many private collections across the country.
